

Anaphylaxis

Updated Anaphylaxis guidelines for Victorian Schools by the Department of Education and Training

We would like to raise awareness to our school community that there have been some changes to our mandated management of Anaphylaxis for our students.

All staff are required to complete Anaphylaxis online E Training and complete the accredited practical demonstration competency requirements.

Changes to our management of anaphylaxis at school include:

- Administration of an adrenaline auto injector (Epipen) to a student who has not previously been diagnosed with anaphylaxis but is showing symptoms and appears to be having a first time episode of anaphylaxis. In this instance the school generic general use Epipen would be administered and 000 called.
- If a student shows no improvement after administration of the Epipen another Epipen may be administered every 5 minutes.
- ASCIA advises that no serious harm is likely to occur from mistakenly administering adrenaline to an individual who is not experiencing anaphylaxis.
- If further doses are required we have now been advised that we can use an out of date or cloudy Epipen as a last resort, where there is no other option.
- Guidelines also state that if there is no other option we can now use another student's personal Epipen on a student suffering anaphylaxis. In this instance school staff will call 000 and ensure the student whose Epipen has been used is not exposed to any risks, for example supervising them indoors, restricting eating to low risk foods. The school will immediately purchase a replacement Epipen from a pharmacy at the school's expense.
- Changes to the policy also includes using an adult Epipen (Yellow) on a child over the age of one but under 20kgs or using a Junior Epipen (green) on an adult in preference to not using one at all.

These changes have been introduced in an attempt to provide a dose of adrenaline in a life threatening situation, in the situation that may arise where all available Epipen's have been administered, the student has not responded or it is a first time previously undiagnosed anaphylactic reaction. The above changes would be highly unlikely to need to be implemented, and would be used as a last resort. For further information please follow the attached link
